Presentation of the

Ethics Commission Report on Public Campaign Financing Program for the November 3, 2020 Election

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City & County of San Francisco Ethics Commission

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Following each election cycle, the Ethics Commission prepares a report on the public financing program for the Mayor and Board of Supervisors.

This presentation highlights some of the key findings from the report prepared in connection with the November 2020 election cycle.

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To encourage more candidate participation, reduce dependency on private contributions, and increase the "value" of small donors, the following changes were implemented to the program prior to the November 2020 election:

- Initial payment amounts increased to \$60,000
- Total per candidate funding was increased to \$255,000 for Board of Supervisor candidates
- Public funds issued at a 6:1 ratio for all eligible contributions.
- A \$150 per contributor cap was put in place for all eligible contributions.

The November 2020 Election saw the highest rate of participation since program inception – 62% of candidates appearing on ballot.

Previous high was 48% in 2010

In 2020, public funds represented 58% of all funds received by candidates. This marks the first-time public funds disbursed to candidates exceeded private contributions raised by candidates.

Average total distribution was \$215,949 per candidate; this exceeds the previous high* of \$126,858 in 2016.

The total amount of public funds disbursed was \$3,455,177; this exceeds the previous high of \$1,522,296 in 2016.

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Candidate spending totaled of \$5,428,682. Public funds disbursed, \$3,455,084, represents 64% of the expenditures made by candidates.

This is the first-time public financing eclipsed 50% of candidate spending and exceeds the previous high of 41%, observed in 2010 and 2012.


Total Candidate Expenditures \$5,428,682

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While third party spending was down in 2020, the third lowest level since program inception, all six Supervisorial races were impacted.

Candidate spending still exceeded third-party spending by more than 5:1



This post-election reporting is primarily descriptive in nature and is intended to increase transparency and understanding in how public funds are used.

While some observations could be made, future analysis will be necessary to fully assess the impact of changes made to the program
