Government Ethics and Conflict of Interest Review Project - Gifts Background

- Federal criminal charges: 11 individuals
 - 2 City Dept. Heads; 1 City Employee
 - Plea Agreements: 8 individuals (1 City employee)
- Local criminal charges: 1 individual (former City employee)
- City officials and employees resigned or terminated: 6

San Francisco's Restricted Source Rule

- City officials and employees cannot accept gifts from restricted sources*
 - Persons doing or seeking to do business with their department
 - Persons who have sought to influence the official or employee

*Subject to exceptions

Background

Alleged Gifts from Restricted Sources (Federal Complaints):

- Free meals and alcohol
- Travel costs for vacations
- \$30,000 watch
- \$40,000 tractor
- \$250,000 of construction services

Background

Apparent Gifts from Restricted Sources (Review of Form 700 Sample):

- An official was reportedly contacted by a registered lobbyist and then accepted a gift from that lobbyist within seven months of the reported lobbying contact.
- An official reported receiving a dinner and piece of apparel from an entity at a time when the entity was seeking to enter into a contract with the department and likely had attempted to influence departmental decision-makers regarding the contract.
- An official accepted a gift of tickets from an entity that was currently doing business with and actively pursuing additional business opportunities with the department.

Goals

- ✓ Reduce danger of undue influence
- ✓ Prevent opportunities for bribes
- √ Improve organizational culture
- ✓ Restore public trust

Approach

- ➤ Eliminate loopholes in gift rules
- ➤ Make gift rules more robust
- ➤Improve rules' clarity

- **≻**Education
- >Enforcement

Recommendation 1: Remove many of the state law exceptions that affect the Restricted Source Rule

- ➤ Not created with restricted sources in mind
- >Undermine the purposes of the rule

Recommendation 2: Reform the local exceptions to the Restricted Source Rule

- > Broad exceptions create opportunities for abuse
 - > Free meals
 - ➤ Periodic small gifts

Recommendation 3: Ensure that the Restricted Source Rule applies broadly

- ➤ Prohibit restricted sources from giving a gift
- > Prohibit use of intermediaries to launder gifts
- ➤ Prohibit gifts to family members

Recommendation 4: Clarify how the Restricted Source Rule applies to those doing business with the City

- Define contract, contract proposal, permit applicant, etc.
- >Applies to gifts from owners, directors, and officers of restricted-source entities

Recommendation 5: Reform the exceptions to the subordinate gift rule

- Clarify which occasions are acceptable for accepting a gift
- ➤ Impose limit

Recommendation 6: Prohibit gifts from permit expediters to officials and employees in permit-issuing departments

>Model the rule on the lobbyist gift rule

"Government decisions of officers and employees of the City and County should be, and should appear to be, made on a fair and impartial basis."
